Course Objective: This course will cover the major topics from the field of child psychology from a scientific theory and research perspective. The course will focus on development from conception through childhood in the following domains, biosocial, cognitive, and psychosocial. Additionally, the class will examine factors that influence child development such as culture, family, school, environment, and peers.

Course Format: The course employs a combination of lecture, video clips, papers, and discussion. In order to prepare, students should read the assigned readings prior to attending class.

Technology: Students will be expected to obtain course information from the course website: http://adp.gmu.edu/members/dpatel7/teaching.htm. Additionally, students will be expected to use their GMU email account, and should check this account frequently. Correspondence with students outside of class will be via e-mail.

Exams: There will be 4 non-cumulative exams, one of which will be taken on the final exam time/day. Exams will consist of multiple choice and short answer. There will be **NO** make-up exams, in order to account for sickness and other personal matters, **students will be allowed to drop ONE** of the first 3 exams; the 4th exam is **MANDATORY**. Exams will be worth 50 points each.

Research Paper: Students will write a **5-8 page** paper (double-spaced, 12pt font) on a topic of their choice, relating to child development/psychology. Students will submit a topic for their paper by **Sept. 13**th for approval; points will be taken off for late submissions. Students will be informed of their due dates once topic submissions have been reviewed.

- ➤ Use **SSCI**, **PsycINFO**, and the **Library** to search for articles on your topic.
- ➤ Pick articles from reputable, peer-reviewed journals. Check with me if you are unsure.
- In the research paper, be sure to include the following sections: (1) *Introduction* a brief description of the topic you are addressing in the paper, (2) *Goal of paper* what aspect of the topic are you interested in addressing and why is this topic important, (3) *Previous Literature* what research has been done in the past, and what are the general findings, (4) *Conclusions* what is the take-home message, and overall conclusion. (5) *References* cite your sources.
- Examples of topics: These are general directions, I expect students to come up with their own topic.
 - o Complications of prenatal teratogens.
 - The affects of various disciplinary actions on young children.
 - o Language learning in Autistic children.
 - o Day care's consequences on cognitive development.

Paper Presentations: Students will present their paper in an 8-10 minute power point presentation, including a brief summary of the topic, main research findings, and own conclusions/thoughts.
