It will emphasize the developmental context of various disorders, risk and resiliency factors, and environmental and biological contributions.

Extra Credit Option: One way to understand disorders of childhood is to read written narratives, watch movies or documentaries, or study artistic depictions. For any of the behavior disorders covered in this course, write a 5 page typed double-spaced review of any book, story, movie, or documentary depicting disorders of childhood. The review should include a complete citation (name, date, source, etc.) and should discuss the depiction of the disorder relative to the information you have learned in the textbook or lecture. For example, you might note that several of the characteristics presented in a movie are not typical characteristics of schizophrenia. You can also find 10 pieces of art, print out pictures of the art, and write a one-page description for each addressing the depiction of mental disorders. Turn in a hard copy in class on **December 5**. This Extra Credit Option can add up to 5 percent to your grade.
