Course Objectives:

At the end of this course, students should be able to describe the theories of developmental psychology, identify the domains of development (physical, cognitive, and social-emotional), summarize aspects of each developmental stage, and recognize the developmental changes that take place across the entire life-span.

There will be various in-class activities, from being involved in small group discussions to watching videos that target specific concepts of developmental psychology. All these activities are designed to encourage active learning and add variety to our class time.

Exams:

It is imperative not to be late for exams. As soon as the first student turns in his/her exam, no other students will be allowed to come in class and take the test. There will be a total of four multiplechoice exams, from which three are mandatory. The final exam is cumulative. Students may take all four exams, but their lowest grade will be dropped. Extra Credits:

For earning extra credits, students need to write an essay (worth 10 points) on **any one** of the two movies presented in class. This assignment will facilitate the development of critical thinking skills and allow students to apply the declarative knowledge acquired in class to real-life circumstances. This assignment is not a merely movie critique; it has to meet the following requirements:

◀ Write (only!) one concise paragraph that describes the purpose and the main points of the film;

Apply the material learned in class/textbook. You have the chance to make an intelligent
connection between aspects related to the movie and the general principles covered in the textbook
or presented in class;

◄ Include at least two scientific references (excluding the textbook). You need to prove that you think scientifically and have a grasp of how to use the APA style in your writing;

◄ Respect this format: two to three pages (no less than two), double spaced, 1 inch margins, and a 12 point font;

◄ (optional) Integrate your personal experiences. This is a good opportunity for self-reflection and for capitalizing on your relevant firsthand experience.

The instructor will assign a pass-fail grade (you earned 10 points or 0 points) for this informal assignment. Therefore, only students who respect all the above mentioned criteria will gain the extra points. Further details will be provided in class.
