PAPER:

The paper is to be done in two parts. You are to pick a novel or movie of your choice that highlights a particular pathology from the course through one or more of the characters. If you need help picking a novel or movie, I will be happy to assist you.

First you are to hand in a typed two page summary of what you are going to write about. The 2 page paper is to include the following: the name of the novel or movie with a brief summary of the plot, what pathology is illustrated within the contents, why you believe this is the correct diagnosis, and a brief outline of the information that you will include in the final paper about this diagnostic category.

The final paper will include: the common development for the diagnostic category, the symptoms of the illness, the causes of the illness, and evidence based treatments for that mental illness. The paper must site at least 6 primary sources, and should be at 8-12 pages. Throughout the paper, you need to explain how the character in the novel or movie that you have chosen is consistent with (or inconsistent with) typical recognized symptoms and course of the disorder.
