#### **Exams**

Exams will cover both in class lectures/ videos and readings from the text. Journal articles will be assigned that are available on-line and they may also be on the exams. Exams 1-3 will cover the chapters denoted in the class-by-class outline below. The final exam will focus mainly on material from the last fourth of the course, but will have some cumulative information on it. Each exam will consist of multiple choice questions, short answer and essay-type questions. Each exam is worth 100 points. Your lowest exam grade will be dropped. The final exam grade may not be dropped.

#### **Presentation**

Each student will participate in a group presentation that is worth 50 points. The presentation group will be assigned the second week of class. Each group will be assigned a specific topic related to adolescent psychology. Grading criteria for the presentation is posted on webct.
