Course Objectives:

This course will present an advanced overview of theories and research related to intimate relationships, including romantic relationships, as well as relationships among family members and friends. It will encourage students to think critically about the components of healthy relationships, and prompt students to give careful consideration to choices they make with regard to their intimate relationships.

Grading in this course will be based on the following:

1. **Class Participation (25 pts)** – Attend each class and complete all reading assignments from required text. It is expected that each student will come to each class session prepared and that s/he will participate in discussions generated through class activities and lecture. Students will be deducted participation points for the course if they have more than one (1) unexcused absence during the semester.
2. **Journal Articles Review (20 pts)** – Students will review three (3) current professional journal articles related to intimate relationships and write a 3-5 page APA-format summary.
3. **Group Presentation (30pts)** – Each group will select a topic related to intimate relationships and give a 30 minute in-class presentation. Students are encouraged to present their material in a creative manner, using technology, art, role-play, poetry, music, or interactive methods. Each group will turn-in a 1 page summary of their presentation and a reference list.
4. **Final Exam (25 pts)** – This take-home exam will be comprehensive and cumulative.
