Course Description: This course focuses on the scientific study of processes of change and stability

throughout the human life span.

Course Objectives:

At the end of this course, students should be able to describe the theories of developmental psychology, identify the domains of development (physical, cognitive, and social-emotional), summarize aspects of each developmental stage, and recognize the developmental changes that take place across the entire life-span.

Course Design:

Lecture material will have a Power Point format and will be a mixture of information gathered from your textbook and additional sources. There will be various in-class activities, from being involved in small group discussions to watching videos that target specific concepts of developmental psychology. All these activities are designed to encourage active learning and add variety to our class time.

Course Requirements:

- Students are required to attend every class and are accountable for missing important information relevant to their knowledge and their performance on exams. It is strongly suggested that you be on time.
- Students are also responsible for reading in advance the assigned chapters in order to have at least a gist of what is going to be presented in class.

Exams:

It is imperative not to be late for exams. As soon as the first student turns in his/her exam, no other student will be allowed to take the test. There will be a total of <u>four</u> multiple-choice exams, from which <u>three</u> are mandatory. The final exam is <u>not</u> cumulative. Students may take all four exams, but their lowest grade will be dropped. There is no make-up of exams. Students are required to bring a **pencil** and a **green scantron** that can be purchased at the bookstore **before** the exam starts. Research Paper:

Students will have to write <u>a four to five page paper</u> on a topic of developmental psychology. 6 or 7 students (randomly selected by the instructor and notified during the 1st week) will turn in their research papers (a hard copy and an electronic copy) every Friday, beginning with the 5th week of classes (see the

Schedule of Topics, Readings, and Exams). The paper should:

- be typed (<u>12</u> point font <u>Times New Roman</u>), double spaced, and have <u>1 inch margins</u>.
- have a cover sheet that includes your name, the title of your paper, your G#, course name and section number, and the date.
- ✓ reference <u>at least 5 valid sources</u>, using <u>APA format</u>.

A list with possible topics will be provided in class or via e-mail. Further details will be discussed in class.

Extra Credits:

For earning extra credits, students will have to write <u>a two to three page essay</u> (worth 5 %) on a movie selected from a list provided in class by the instructor. This movie critique has to meet the requirements already mentioned above (see Research Paper) plus the following:

- Write only half a page in which you describe the main points of the film (the narrative);
- Apply the material learned in class/textbook. You need to connect aspects related to the movie with general principles covered in the textbook or presented in class;
- ◀ Include <u>at least two</u> scientific references (<u>excluding</u> the textbook). Use the APA style!
- ◀ Integrate your personal experiences. This is a good opportunity for self-reflection and for capitalizing on your relevant firsthand experience.

The instructor will assign a pass-fail grade for this assignment (students will earn 5 % or 0 %). Therefore, only students who satisfy **all** these requirements will earn the extra points.
