**Course Objective:** This course covers the major areas of developmental psychology. The course emphasizes an understanding of the important methods, terms, theories, and findings in the field of developmental psychology. By the end of the semester, students should gain a basic understanding of how psychological theory contributes to our understanding of the many aspects of human development.

**Course Format:** The course employs a combination of lecture, video clips, and discussion. In order to prepare, you should read the assigned readings prior to attending class. Students will be expected to obtain course information from the website listed above. Additionally, grades will be updated frequently on the course website. Students should also check their GMU e-mail accounts, as correspondence will be sent via e-mail.

**Exams:** There will be 4 non-accumulative exams (including the final) dispersed throughout the session covering everything (text, lectures, videos, and articles). There will be **NO** make-up exams. In order to account for sickness and other personal matters, **each student's lowest exam grade will be dropped.** If a student has taken the first 3 exams during the semester and is satisfied with his/her grade, the student has the option of not taking the final exam. Exams will consist of multiple choice questions, and will be worth 50 points each, accounting for **150 points** of the student's final grades.

\**Note:* Students who arrive 15 minutes after the start of an exam will not be permitted to take it—PLEASE COME ON TIME!

Assignments: There will be 6 assignments of which students will be required to do 5. Students will read the articles assigned for a given week, and write a minimum of a one-page double-spaced reflection paper <u>for each</u> article assigned for that week (please note that some weeks have two articles, to receive full credit you need to do reflections for each article for that week). Papers should include a well-thought-out critique, and any thoughts, comments and questions about the article. Assignments will be turned in at the beginning of class on the due date; late assignments and/or e-mailed assignments will <u>not</u> be accepted. Students should be prepared to discuss the article(s) in class on the due date. Each assignment will be worth 8 points, accounting for **40 points** of the students' final grade. Articles will be available on the course website.

**Extra Credit:** An optional extra credit assignment will be available worth **5 points** toward student's final grade. Details will be provided on the course website.
