PSYC 314: Adolescent Psychology Summer (Session B) 2006

**Course objective**: This course will examine the emotional, cognitive, social and physical development that occurs during adolescence. Students will gain an understanding of early to current theories of adolescent development in addition to reviewing current empirical research about various topics of interest. In addition, the class is structured in an attempt to create an environment in which to discuss, debate and explore the information presented as well as student's knowledge and experiences.

**Required text**: Adolescence 11<sup>th</sup> ed. (2007) by John W. Santrock McGraw-Hill; ISBN: 0073228753.

**Class Organization/Participation**: Students are expected to attend all scheduled class meetings. Students are responsible for all material and announcements presented in class, including announcements about changes in the schedule and assignments. Class time will be used as a platform for interactive discussion of current topics and readings. Lecture will be taken from various resources including the required text in addition to other empirical readings from psychological journals. Although attendance will not be taken into account per say, participation is. Class participation can be defined as coming to class with assigned class readings completed, discussion topics/ questions prepared, and willingness to participate during the entirety of the class.

**Exams**: There will be three exams throughout the semester. The exams will cover material covered in class lecture as well as the readings assigned. Exams will offer a variety of formats (e.g. multiple choice, short answer, essay, etc.). If classes are cancelled on a test day for any reason, then the test will be given on the first day classes resume.

**Exam make-up policy**: The following policy refers to <u>all</u> scheduled exams. Not included in this policy are exams taken ahead of time (through arrangement with the professor). There will be no exam make-ups or extensions without penalty except in instances such as the following:

- hospitalization or illness that has been documented and judged by your instructor as preventing you from (a) preparing adequately for a test or (b) sitting for a test
- death or serious illness in your family
- court appearances

Documentation must be provided by health officials (e.g., a physician or member of the student center health staff) in the case of illness; an immediate family member in the case of a death or serious illness in the family; and official paperwork in the case of court

dates. Students failing to produce such documentation <u>will be penalized at least one full</u> <u>letter grade</u>. Decisions about whether and when to allow a student to make up an exam will be made on a case-by-case basis.

**Paper:** Each student will be expected to complete one scholarly paper. Choose a topic within the domain of Adolescent Development such as: a theory of adolescence or a topic within adolescence (e.g. timing of maturation, substance abuse in adolescence, ethnic differences in adolescents and their families, eating disorders in adolescents, internet use and adolescents, etc.). All topics are subject to approval from professor. You will be expected to locate 8 empirical sources (at least 5 journal articles are required sources; do not cite other textbooks as sources) and list the sources at the end of your paper. Try to integrate one theory we have discussed in class as you consider the research. Use APA format for the paper. Papers must be typed. Papers will be evaluated on how well you organize the paper, writing, and presentation of the findings from the sources (Further information will be provided about the format of the paper, due dates etc. during class).

**Evaluation and Grades:** The final grade will be based on a total of 400 points as follows:
